NINTH ANNUAL Railsplitting Days





May 21, 22, 28, 29, June 4, 5, 11, 12, 1977

You will hear the sounds of the woodsman's axe and maul fill the air during your special visit to Rockome Gardens this spring. Railsplitting Days features log sawing with horse power, railsplitting, rail fence making, and old-fashioned shingle sawing with steam power.

Unlike spring on the farm more than fifty years ago, when everyone was expected to lend a hand, you won't have to help. Just crowd up close and watch. There will be old-timers around to explain the machinery and to reminisce about their own youthful experiences on the farm.

And, as the wood chips fly, think back to the days when Abraham Lincoln split rails for his father Tom's farm not far away in Macon County. The rails you see being split will be used for fencing at Rockome Gardens.

Craftsmen from Illinois and Indiana will demonstrate such crafts as blacksmithing and harness making, pottery making, chair caning, candlemaking, rug weaving, glass blowing, quilting, and many others. And don't miss the homemade corn meal being stone ground at Yoder's Grist Mill.

The Amish are a religious sect originally from Germany and Switzerland. Friendly and hard-working, they prefer not to be photographed. As you drive, please be cautious. Amish buggies travel more slowly than you may realize. As you slow to pass, give our neighbors a friendly wave.
