I invite you to submit for my consideration several of your best poems or song lyrics. Remember, they do not have to deal only with the war. Poems and lyrics on every subject will be used. You probably have several now ready. Send these to me at once, whatever the subject, before this important opportunity slips your mind until it is too late. If my letter has inspired you to write on other subjects, submit these later, but before the final submission date noted on the printed leaflet enclosed. This is a splendid opportunity to have your work published in a book where it will be seen and read. It may mean the beginning of a successful career for you.
