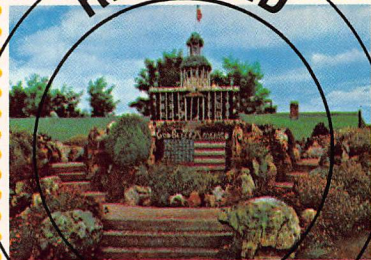
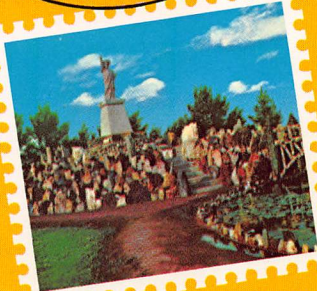


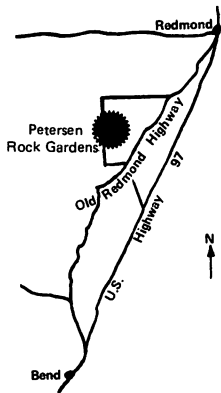
PETERSEN ROCK GARDEN

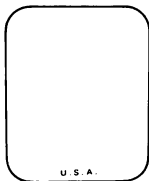




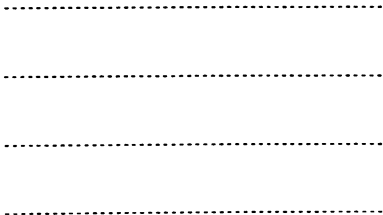
PETERSEN ROCK GARDENS, located just off Highway 97 between Bend and Redmond, Oregon, is the 17 year creation of Rasmus Petersen, a Danish immigrant farmer. As a hobby, Mr. Petersen began constructing miniature bridges, towers, terraces, and buildings of intricate detail using thousands of different types of rocks. In addition to the miniature rock structures, the grounds are graced by luxurious flowers and fauna, placid ponds, and free roaming peacocks. Open 365 days a year, the grounds and museum are supported by public donations at the entrance gate.

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
