## WASHINGTON - MILTON WALKER - WALKER ROCK GARDEN

- 1905 Milton Walker was born in Rockford, WA,
- 1930s Wishing for the WPA as a landscaper for a camp Long Creek <sup>now</sup>, <sup>and</sup> ~~where he worked in~~  
1941 He and his wife Florence purchased a vacant lot  
next to the horse. In his backyard he began  
making a set of wading pools.
- ca. 1959 By this year the terraces had been constructed.

- 1950s The Walker family visited Wenatchee, where they saw  
the Ohme rock gardens. One home, Milton built  
the concrete 'Blue Lake' surrounding it with ~~cement~~  
~~of cement and Oregon needle rocks from the Grand Canyon area)~~  
mountains, capped with white painted snow.

During his spare time - rotations on Boeing lay-offs, Milton who worked in mock-up at Boeing constructed an elaborate garden. The garden open to include waterfalls and walls decorated with stones collected during family outings.

- 1960s He and Florence bought ~~a rock shop~~ the entire stock  
of eggs, agates, agates and other rocks for \$150 from  
an Oregon man closing his rock shop. For 11 weekends  
they hauled 10 tons of rock from Oregon to their  
back- and side-yards in Seattle.

He was  
inspired to create one-of-a-kind paving stones of  
sunrises, squares or butterflies. Using sand in a  
wooden form, he put in the rocks with their best  
side down, poured over cement, and let it stand  
overnight. <sup>Then</sup> he would release the mold.

The garden is composed of walls, walkways, towers and areas decorated with semi-precious stones, glass, fossils, quartz, ~~and~~ thunder eggs, petrified wood and ~~and~~ cement.

1970's He retired from Boeing (Soct 1984)

1984 Milton Walker died.
