Do you know of anyone who might be interested in such a proposition? If you do I would be glad to hear from them or have their name and address.

By the way, does your group have the book "From Rhyme s to Riches" by Al. Lewis, the song writer? If you do not have it may I advise that it is invaluable to the beginning song writer in as much as it does not point out an easy way (it seems there is none) to become successful in the song writing business but rather points up the the obstacles. The cost of the book is negligible—one dollar.

In closing I might add that I am a trustworthy person and I own my own home here in Medford. I can furnish references also. Hoping that I may hear from you soon
